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

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Final 2022 Legislative Session Report Wednesday, March 9, 2022

The following is a review of some of the legislation discussed at this year's Utah State Legislature that affects hospitals.

#### **Another Strong Session For Utah's Hospitals And Health Systems**

Many positive things happened for Utah's hospitals and health systems this session. We are grateful to the UHA Board, led by Chair Brian Dunn, and the UHA Government Relations Committee, chaired by Mike Clark, for giving excellent counsel and guidance on a wide variety of issues. We also appreciate the many UHA members and lobbyists who all worked together to make this a positive session. UHA is grateful to work with so many individuals committed to making healthcare better in Utah, including good healthcare policy.

#### 3% Funding Increase In Medicaid For Hospitals and Health Systems

UHA worked with our legislative allies to successfully obtain tens of millions in new overall state and federal Medicaid funding. This includes a 3% increase (or over \$35 million) for hospitals, providers and ACOs for the coming year that hospitals and health systems should be aware of as they negotiate new contracts with ACOs. In addition, Medicaid overall is well funded through the upcoming fiscal year. Medicaid expansion funding also remains healthy so no current concerns of using additional hospital assessment funds for that. H.B. 80—Diabetes Prevention Program passed and will allow Medicaid reimbursement for diabetes prevention services for the first time. S.B. 185—Children's Health Coverage Amendments would have extended Medicaid and CHIP coverage to all children living in Utah not currently covered due to citizenship status. The bill passed the Senate but did not pass the House and therefore did not become law.

#### **Mental Health Funding and Legislation**

The large increases in mental health funding that have occurred over the past few years have been maintained and added upon. In addition, there were a number of bills that have passed to improve mental health policy. For example, <u>H.B. 236—Behavioral Health Amendments</u> passed and makes a number of positive changes in this important area. <u>H.B. 261—Civil Commitment Revisions</u> allows for physician assistants and nurse

practitioners to sign for a civil commitment of a patient when a physician is not readily available. This will be especially helpful in some of our rural hospitals. In addition, <a href="https://mx.363-ModificationsTo Civil Commitment">H.B. 363-Modifications To Civil Commitment</a> lengthens the time for a civil commitment from one day to three days in certain circumstances. <a href="mailto:s.B. 171-Behavioral Health">S.B. 171-Behavioral Health</a>
<a href="mailto:curriculum Program">Curriculum Program</a> also passed and requires the Huntsman Mental Health Institute to develop a public education mental health curriculum to be used in Utah's schools.

#### **Healthcare Workforce Funding and Legislation Is Very Positive**

There was a lot of positive movement to help with improving the healthcare workforce this session. UHA and its members successfully lobbied for an additional \$2 million dollars above current funding to expand public university healthcare workforce slots. In addition, the Legislature passed H.B. 295—Physician Workforce Amendments which funds close to \$5 million in grants to hospitals who wish to begin a physician residency program. It also funds a new psychiatric residency at the University of Utah. The Legislature also funded \$60 million for the University of Utah Medical School. In addition, the Legislature approved bonding authority of up to \$400 million for the University of Utah to build a new hospital campus and medical center in West Valley City and also up to \$65 million for an expansion of a separate mental health facility. The Legislature also passed H.B. 32—Health Care Worker Protection Amendments that makes it an enhanced crime to assault any healthcare worker. H.B. 176—Utah Health Workforce Act also passed. This legislation sets up an advisory council to coordinate future healthcare worker needs as well as provide for better collection of data to make more informed workforce decisions. Finally, S.B. 101—Nurse Apprentice Licensing Act allows nursing students in their final semester to be licensed as nurses to be able to join the workforce quicker.

#### Other Important Funding Impacting Hospitals and Health Systems

There were a number of other positive funding areas for hospitals and health systems this session. UHA helped to maintain \$250,000 in ongoing funding for **Get Healthy Utah** to continue its population health initiative. The \$300,000 in ongoing funds for the rural physician loan repayment program was also maintained. In addition, the Legislature funded \$3 million for a new health reform initiative championed by Governor Cox. The Governor's new Utah Sustainable Health Collaborative will use these funds to find collaborative ways to improve the health of Utahns. UHA's CEO Greg Bell will be on the Executive Committee of this new organization to lead these efforts.

#### **COVID-19-Related Bills and Issues**

There were a number of bills dealing with the COVID pandemic. H.B. 60—Vaccine Passport Amendments was a highly debated bill dealing with vaccines that ultimately did not pass the Legislature. H.B. 63—COVID 19 Vaccines Exemptions did pass and allows employees who have had COVID-19 to obtain a letter from a physician exempting them from a vaccine requirement by certain employers. Early in the session, a joint resolution, S.J.R. 3—Joint Resolution To Terminate Public Health Orders Pertaining To Face Coverings passed, terminating all public orders to wear masks except in certain circumstances. S.B. 194—Medical Rationing Amendments also passed. This legislation sets up a process for the Legislature to be informed about any medical rationing of scarce resources and a process for determining when medical rationing would occur. Finally, H.B. 316—Medical Assistant Amendments passed and will allow medical assistants to give vaccinations.

## Merger of Utah Department of Health and Utah Department of Human Services Moves Forward And Will Be Finalized July 1, 2022

<u>S.B. 45—Department of Health and Human Services</u> passed and laid out the final process for a full merger by July 1, 2022. UHA will continue to be involved heavily in this new combined agency to continue to make sure that hospital voices are heard, particularly with Medicaid funding and eligibility, mental health and rural health issues.

#### Other Health Care Bills That Passed Of Interest To Hospitals

There were a number of other bills that passed of interest to hospitals. UHA actively supported H.B. 344—Utah Medical Candor Act and a companion resolution amending Utah court rules of procedure and evidence in a medical malpractice case. This legislation will, for the first time in Utah, allow hospitals and providers to have discussions with patients when a medical injury occurs and those discussions will not be admitted in a court case if future litigation ensues. This is a voluntary process for all concerned but it is hoped that this new option will lessen future litigation and allow healing in a more timely fashion. The current option of litigation will still be open to all. This could be a real breakthrough in medical malpractice litigation in Utah. Please consult your own legal counsel about this new option. UHA also supported H.B. 293—Ground Ambulance Interfacility Transport Licensing and it passed. This legislation will help facilitate interfacility transports for hospitals in certain geographic areas of the state. H.B. 225—Access To Medical Records Amendments passed and requires the Department of Health and Human Services by the end of 2022 to promulgate by rule a new standard statewide HIPAA release form for all providers, hospitals, patients and patient representatives to use when requesting patient records. UHA will be actively involved in that rulemaking process.

#### **Bills That Did Not Pass Impacting Hospitals**

UHA and UHA-member hospitals were instrumental and powerful in stopping a number of bills that would have been detrimental to hospitals and health systems. <a href="H.B. 116">H.B. 116</a>—Medical Billing Amendments</a> would have had a major impact on current medical billing practices by severely limiting the time allowed for hospitals and all other health providers to bill and collect from patients. UHA led the fight to successfully stop this bill. <a href="H.B. 58">H.B. 58</a>—Surgical Smoke</a>
<a href="Evacuation System Requirements">Evacuation System Requirements</a> was costly overregulation that also failed. Many hospitals already do what this bill would have required and many more will likely follow so this was an unnecessary bill tied to a national agenda.

#### **Pharmacy Bills Have Mixed Success**

UHA supported S.B. 236—Pharmacy Practice Amendments and it passed. Of particular interest to hospitals, this legislation will allow hospital pharmacies to give patients at discharge up to a 72-hour supply of prescription drugs (rather than the current one day supply) under certain circumstances. UHA also supported H.B. 308—Prescription Drug Amendments but it did not pass as it hit an unexpected buzzsaw with House leadership and the opposition of Pharma. This legislation would have helped Utah's hospitals that are part of the federal 340b program and will be a priority to continue to pursue in the next legislative session

#### Many Bills Dealing With Provider Scope of Practice and Licensing This Session

There were many bills dealing with scope of practice and licensing for acupuncturists, chiropractors, associate physicians, occupational therapists, medical assistants, naturopathic physicians and others. These can be reviewed on the attached list of bills. Two were hotly debated. S.B. 121—Anesthesiologist's Assistants Licensing Act passed and allows for the first time in Utah a new category of licensed provider called an Anesthesiology Assistant. They must have certain qualifications including supervision by an anesthesiologist, who can supervise up to four at a time under certain circumstances. Hospitals will still have full credentialling and decision-making authority whether to use these new providers. H.B. 224—Optometrist Practice Amendments was also controversial and failed. It would have allowed optometrists to do limited eye surgery that under current law only ophthalmologists can do.

#### **Other General Healthcare Legislation of Interest**

There were many bills dealing with a variety of issues for healthcare and those not mentioned here are listed in the attached list of bills. For example, only one abortion bill was drafted but was not heard or passed this session. Several bills amending the law dealing with Medical Cannabis did pass as that has become an annual ritual to fine tune that program. A bill dealing with assisted end of life was debated and defeated in the House Health Committee.

#### **UTAH HOSPAC Golf Tournament in June!**

One of the best ways to support **UTAH HOSPAC**, our political action committee, is our 22nd annual golf tournament that will be held once again at Thanksgiving Point on Monday, June 13, 2022. We encourage each hospital to provide a foursome at the tournament as that goes a long way for most hospitals in meeting their annual HOSPAC goal. Look for additional information soon on the golf tournament as well as other opportunities to contribute to **UTAH HOSPAC**. You can go to the UHA website to register your team soon.

#### 2022 Is A Big Election Year In Utah

One U.S. Senator, all four Utah Congressman, fifteen State Senators and all 75 state house legislators are up for election this year. This is especially important as almost all are running in newly created districts from the recent reapportionment process. This means that you may have new representatives representing you and your hospital that ou need to engage with. Our combined influence works best so we encourage you to be involved in the electoral process and support local leaders that will support you and your hospital. A number of legislators with great experience and support for hospitals are retiring and we need to all work to educate new candidates and legislators on how important hospitals are to their communities.
